<u>American Society of Hematology Minority Medical Student Award Program</u>

Deadline: Dec 15, 2016 (Mentor request form); Feb 1, 2017 (Application)

The Minority Medical Student Award Program aims to increase the number of underrepresented minorities in hematology. The program is for **medical students** in their early years of medical school and features an 8-12 week summer research experience (open to years 1–2), as well as a flexible research experience that is to be completed over the course of a year (open to years 1–3). **Check the website for eligibility requirements**.

As part of the program, students will collaborate with an American Society of Hematology (ASH) member who will serve as their research mentor. Program participants are also paired with an ASH member who will serve as a career-development mentor throughout their medical schooling and residency. Students will present their findings at the end of the program at the ASH Annual Meeting & Exposition. Students who participate in the program may apply to the program for a second summer research experience. Participants will receive a stipend of \$5000 and \$2000 allowance for travel to the ASH annual meeting held in early December.

American Society of Hematology Physician-Scientist Career Development Award

Deadline: Jan 6, 2017

The American Society of Hematology (ASH) is offers the Physician-Scientist Career Development Award as an opportunity for **medical students** to gain experience in hematology research by immersing themselves in a fulltime, yearlong laboratory, translational, or clinical investigation under the mentorship of an ASH member. The award amount total is \$42,000 which includes a stipend, allowance for supplies, insurance/educational expenses and meeting attendance.

The award is for a one-year period, generally July 1, 2017 through June 30, 2018. Applicants must be in years 1–3, and have a mentor who is an active member of ASH. **MD-PhD students will not be considered.** Please visit the website for additional information and application guidelines.

Dr. Grounds's research focuses on controlling the repair of damaged skeletal muscle and on potential treatments for muscle diseases. This talk will feature research related to molecular and cellular changes *in vivo* in skeletal muscles during early post-natal growth, as well as sarcopenia, which is the age-related loss of skeletal muscle mass and function.

Speaker: Professor <u>Timothy Caulfield</u>, Canada Research Chair in Health Law and Policy; Professor at the Faculty of Law and the School of Public Health, University of Alberta.

The 2016 C2E2 Annual Lecture will focus on understanding how to handle the large amount of science-free health and wellness advice prevalent in popular culture, much of which is conflicting, misleading, or downright ridiculous.
