Funding Opportunities and Awards

Endocrine Society Summer Research Fellowships Deadline: Dec 8, 2016

The Endocrine Society offers Summer Research Fellowships to both **MD and non-MD undergraduate students**. Awardees will receive a stipend to conduct research under the guidance of a Society member for 10 to 12 weeks during the summer. Applications are accepted from student-supervisor teams. Awardees will be invited to attend ENDO 2018, the Society's Annual Meeting and Expo, following the summer fellowship. Registration, airfare, lodging, and per diem for the duration of the meeting will be provided. Please refer to the website for a complete list of application requirements.

<u>3M National Student Fellowship</u> Deadline: Jan 31, 2017 (to UBC VP of students earlier for approval)

The 3M National Student Fellowship honours up to ten full-time **undergraduate students** at Canadian institutions who have demonstrated outstanding leadership in their lives and at their college or university. Awardees will receive \$5,000 to be spent at their discretion. Each awardee will also be invited to attend the annual conference of the Society for Teaching and Learning in Higher Education, where they will also participate in a 3M National Student Fellowship Program retreat. Applicants must be enrolled in their first undergraduate program, and may not be in their first or last year of study. **MD students who have not completed a prior degree may be eligible** – but must complete their applications carefully to make their eligibility clear to the adjudication committee.

The application process for these awards is extensive and required that the Vice President, Students review the completed package. Please contact the <u>VP students</u> office to confirm their internal deadline. Note that obtaining approvals/signatures can take several weeks.MD and Faculty of Medicine students can contact the FoM Student Research Coordinator if they require assistance obtaining approval or have questions about the application process (<u>med.studentresearch@ubc.ca</u>). Please contact as far in advance of the deadline as possible.

<u>Reminder: So you want to do research next summer...</u> Deadline: as early as November 2016 (but mainly from Jan 1-March 31st)

Most deadlines for summer research funding occur between January-March, but a few targeted opportunities may have earlier deadlines. No need to panic, but if you are hoping to participate in a research project this summer start thinking about funding sooner rather than later. If you wait until spring to start looking you may be too late. This reoccuringseminar series takes place at St. Paul's Hospital on alternating Wednesdays from 12:00-1:00pm. The CHEOS WiP Seminar Series focuses on providing investigators with an opportunity to present ongoing research, obtain feedback from colleagues and peers, and make new connections for their projects. Talks are open to all attendees, and a light lunch is served.

The invited speaker is Dr. Adeera Levin, a Professor Medicine and Head of the Division of Nephrology at UBC. Her research emphasizes the development of an evidence-based transparent system which enhances patient care across the continuum of care for those diagnosed with chronic kidney disease.

The MD/PhD seminar series aims to illustrate the relationship that exists between clinical practice and medical research, allowing students to hear about various career tracks and ways to combine clinical and research work. In addition to their research, speakers discuss their experiences and training backgrounds, share advice with prospective clinician-scientists, and give their opinions on career development options for clinician-scientists.

The seminar's speaker is Parker Jobin. He is an MD/PhD student at the Centre for Blood Research. His research focus is on "moonlighter" proteins which have novel functions outside of the cell that are different from their capacities inside the cell.
