This award supports medical student research in medical history and medical humanities. The research award is \$1,500. Successful applicants may be invited to present his/her research findings at a subsequent meeting of the American Osler Society.

The Bean Award Committee will consider the following criteria in evaluating proposals:

- (1) The project should deal with medical history and/or the other medical humanities
- (2) The goal should be stated clearly
- (3) The goal should be realistic
- (4) The applicant should demonstrate familiarity with the relevant literature
- (5) Originality and a scholarly approach

The Centre for Blood Research would like to extend an invitation to you and your colleagues, trainees, technicians and staff to attend the 5th annual Earl Davie Symposium.

October 15, 2011

This 1-day symposium is held each year in honour of Dr. Earl W. Davie who is a leader in the field of hemostasis-thrombosis, having been the first in the 1960s to describe the blood clotting coagulation cascade. Earl is now over the age of 80 and still an active and prolific scientist at the University of Washington in Seattle. Indeed, he will make the first presentation at the symposium, describing the structural and functional properties of coagulation factor IX, the Royal Disease of Hemophilia involving Queen Victoria. Also featured will be presentations by local experts in vascular biology, hemostasis-thrombosis, and infectious and inflammatory diseases, as well as invited keynote addresses by renowned scientists from Israel and the US.
