CHS Summer Studentships in Inherited Bleeding Disorders Research

Deadline: Nov 15, 2018 *note some application components must be mailed*

The Canadian Hemophilia Society (CHS) will support interested **medical or science undergraduate students** to work for up to 4 months during the summer of 2019 on a research project relevant to inherited bleeding disorders. A stipend of \$6,000 will be offered to the successful candidate. Applicants must be Canadian citizens or permanent residents. **Note that although applications are submitted electronically, some documents must be mailed**. Dr. Robert Hogg (PhD) is a Professor in the Faculty of Health Sciences at SFU and Senior Research Scientist at the BC Centre for Excellence in HIV/AIDS. His academic training includes graduate degrees in Anthropology and Demography. Dr. Hogg's research program strives to evaluate how: therapy optimism affects gay, bisexual, and other men who have sex with men's sexual behavior and rates of new infections; long-term antiretroviral use affects aging and aging related comorbidities; and how different supportive service models of care in BC impact antiretroviral uptake, adherence and retention among these vulnerable groups. The Centre for Health Evaluation & Outcome Sciences (CHÈOS) Work in Progress (WiP) seminar series provides investigators with an opportunity to present ongoing research, obtain feedback from colleagues and peers, and make new connections for their projects. Talks are open, and light refreshments are served.

Speaker: Dr. David Barbic, MD MSc FRCPC, Clinical Assistant Professor, UBC Department of Emergency Medicine

When patients arrive at the emergency department (ED) agitated, aggressive, and with potentially violent behaviour, it is paramount to find a way to address the situation quickly for the safety of patients and ED staff. Patients may be suffering from mental health crises, substance misuse, severe infections, or trauma, and caring for them and other patients is a primary concern for ED staff. This randomized controlled trial investigates the use of intramuscular ketamine compared to current standard care medications for the rapid and safe control of patients in the ED who present to the ED with aggression or violent behaviour. Dr. Barbic will be discussing this study as well as future directions for ED and pre-hospital research in this field.

Speakers: Prof. Azim Surani and Dr. Christopher Murray

Professor Azim Surani, PhD, FMedSci, FRS, is a developmental biologist who has been Marshall—Walton Professor at the Wellcome Trust/Cancer Research UK Gurdon Instituteat the University of Cambridge since 1992, and Director of Germline and Epigenomics Research since 2013. This year he has been awarded the 2018 Canada Gairdner International Award for the discovery of mammalian genomic imprinting that causes parent-of-origin specific gene expression and its consequences for development and disease, along side Dr. Davor Solter.

Christopher Murray, MD, DPhil, is a researcher in global and public health at the University of Washington and is the institute director of the Institute for Health Metrics and Evaluation (IHME). Beginning in 1990, he has worked on ways to measure the burden of disease and disability around the globe. The aim of these efforts, is to provide data for

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policy makers around the world to allocate healthcare resources. This year he has been awarded the 2018 John Dirks Canada Gairdner Global Health Award, for his ground-breaking work. <u>Event poster</u>.
