Funding Opportunities and Awards <u>Parkinson's Foundation Summer Student Fellowship</u> Deadline: Dec 2, 2019

The Summer Student Fellowship supports **undergraduate and medical students** in their pursuit of Parkinson's-related summer research projects. Awardees must identify and work under the supervision of a mentor who is an expert in the Parkinson's community. The summer fellowship is offered for 10 weeks of clinical or laboratory work with a stipend of \$4,000. Upon completion of the project, fellows are invited to apply for up to \$1,000 in travel funds to attend a related scientific conference to present their research. **Check the website hyperlinked above for more information on application materials.**

ASH Physician-Scientist Career Development Award Deadline: Jan 15, 2020

The American Society of Hematology (ASH) is offering the Physician-Scientist Career Development Award as an opportunity for **medical students** to gain experience in hematology research by immersing themselves in a fulltime, yearlong laboratory, translational, or clinical investigation under the mentorship of an ASH member. The award amount total is \$42,000 which includes a stipend, allowance for supplies, insurance/educational expenses and meeting attendance.

The award is for a one-year period, generally July 1, 2020 through June 30, 2021. Applicants must be in years 1–3, obtain the necessary permission to take leave from their MD training program, and be an active member of ASH or have a membership application pending. Health systems worldwide face a common policy challenge: how to deliver high quality care at affordable cost in an equitable way. However, despite persistent attempts at improvement, stasis appears pervasive in many systems. Over the last 25 years there has been in many cases a failure to adapt to emerging health needs and priorities within health systems in Canada. This provides a strong policy rationale to search for alternative strategies that might produce much-needed reforms. Within the natural laboratory Canada provides, the VCH research team has assessed both convergences and divergences in the strategies adopted in various provinces. The team's interest in this research is to explore the transformative capacity of provincial health systems focusing on three questions: Where have provincial governments invested their reform efforts in the last 20 years? What strategies have they employed? What lessons can reformers draw from these experiences?
